Overall, the movable art wall successfully supported our goal of providing young learners with joyful, meaningful experiences that inspire curiosity, creativity, and a lifelong love of learning.

What Went Well

One of the greatest successes of the Paint & Play project was the high level of student engagement and enthusiasm it created during outdoor learning and recess time. Students were excited to participate and quickly embraced the movable art wall as a space for creativity, collaboration, and self-expression. The project provided an inclusive activity that allowed all students to feel successful, including those who may struggle with traditional playground interactions or need additional support with social-emotional regulation. Teachers observed students practicing communication, sharing materials, taking turns, and working together on collaborative artwork in meaningful and developmentally appropriate ways. The art wall also encouraged fine motor development, imaginative thinking, and problem-solving through open-ended exploration. Bringing art outdoors created a calm, joyful environment where students could express themselves freely while building confidence, creativity, and positive peer connections.

What Didn't Go as Planned

One challenge during the implementation of the Paint & Play project was the timeline and installation process. The movable art wall took longer than

expected to arrive, which delayed the start of student use and planned activities. Once the wall arrived, additional adjustments were needed to meet district safety and facility requirements. Originally, the plan included adding wheels to increase portability; however, due to the weight and structure of the wall, this was not approved by the district. As a result, we also had to identify a different location that would safely support the wall and allow for student access and supervision. These unexpected logistical challenges required flexibility and adjustments to the original implementation plan. Despite the delays, the project was successfully set up and ultimately provided meaningful creative experiences for students once fully in place.

Student Preferences and Feedback

Student feedback and preferences surrounding the Paint & Play wall were overwhelmingly positive. Students were consistently excited to use the art wall and often asked for additional opportunities to paint and create during outdoor play time. Many students especially enjoyed the freedom to experiment with colors, spray bottles, and different painting tools in an open-ended environment where there was no "right" or "wrong" way to create. The transparent plexiglass panels encouraged collaboration and interaction, as students naturally worked together, responded to one another's artwork, and engaged in conversations while creating. Teachers also observed that students who were sometimes hesitant during traditional playground activities were highly engaged and confident while using the art wall. The temporary nature of the artwork allowed students to take creative risks without fear of making mistakes, encouraging imagination, flexibility, and joy in the process of creating. Overall, the project became a favorite outdoor activity that fostered creativity, social connection, and a sense of pride among students.

Conclusion

In conclusion, Paint & Play: A Movable Art Wall for Little Innovators successfully provided TK and Kindergarten students with meaningful opportunities for creativity, collaboration, and hands-on learning in an outdoor setting. Despite some implementation challenges and delays, the project
